ACCESSIBILITY EVALUATION

Sports Facilities

Most sports areas in the park are not accessible. In some cases, this can be solved by adding an accessible walkway. In other cases it may be preferable to wait for reconstruction of the area in question and then relocate the sports areas in accessible clusters.

Play Areas

Most play areas in the park are not accessible, but the large areas with quantity and variety of play elements typically are. The goal will be to ensure full accessibility at these large play areas and to ensure that like play experiences are provided for children with disabilities. In some cases it may be feasible to either add an accessible walkway to small play areas or relocate them in accessible clusters.

Golf

The primary obstacle to accessibility in Metroparks golf courses is procedural rather than design-related. At the moment, all courses follow a policy of not allowing golf carts onto the greens or teeing grounds. Changing the policy to allow individuals with disabilities to drive carts onto these spaces would remove a barrier to their participation. Each course should also purchase 1-2 accessible golf carts, which feature swiveling seats to allow all players to reach the tee. Some courses have additional design barriers to participation that must be addressed.

Miniature Golf

The one miniature golf course in the system is at Lake St. Clair, and the first nine holes are accessible.

Draft Community Recreation Plan 2018-2022 Public Review and Comment Summary

The draft Community Recreation Plan was presented to the Board of Commissioners at the July 13, 2017 meeting. Following that meeting, the draft was posted to the planning department web page of the Metroparks website from July 14 – August 25, 2017 for public review and comment. A total of 2,112 website users who visited the planning department web page during this time period had the opportunity to review the plan online. Specific chapters downloaded by website visitors ranged between 224 to 275 downloads. Hard copies of the draft Community Recreation Plan were also made available for public review at each of the thirteen metroparks and administration office.

Comments received during the public review period included representatives from the Motor City Mountain Bike Association (MCMBA) recommending the development of mountain bike trails at Kensington Metropark. The MCMBA expressed the desire for progress on developing mountain bike trails based on the positive response for mountain biking throughout the planning process. In addition, proximity of Kensington to existing mountain bike trail systems would provide the opportunity for it to become a local hub. Following the benchmark of mountain bike facilities at Stony Creek, a similar model at Kensington could create a revenue generator with low cost improvements performed in partnership with the MCMBA.

In addition, representatives from the Huron River Watershed Council (HRWC) had written comments on the Plan to include the existence of water trail facilities and future development taking into account the Natural River designation and universal design for accessibility. The HRWC were also interested in water quality initiatives, specifically in the reduction of PAH sealants for paving projects and supporting the HCMA on future dam related studies planned along the Huron River.

Upon compiling the input, the Planning staff discussed with staff management and refined the plan as appropriate.

Motion by Commissioner Rea, support from Commissioner Williams that the Board of Commissioners' approve the 2020 Marketing Plan, Goals and Strategies and budgetary parameters as recommended by Chief of Marketing and Communications Danielle Mauter and staff.

<u>Discussion</u>: Chief of Marketing and Communications Danielle Mauter updated the Board on marketing and communications and explained where the Metroparks were at going into year two of the marketing plan. She reviewed the goals and objectives for 2019 and the 2020 marketing plan goals highlighting – increasing brand awareness, working toward better internal collaboration, increasing attendance for family events, golf outings and at aquatic facilities, increasing Instagram, Twitter and Facebook followers as well as developing a more comprehensive understanding of the visitor experience at the Metroparks.

Commissioner McCarthy asked what keeps the Metroparks from being at 100 percent in the second objective for goal 16 – develop a more comprehensive understanding of the visitor experience of the Metroparks. Ms. Mauter said not starting to capture evaluations until May last year was a hindrance and that once the Point-of-Sale (POS) system is in place, it will help staff gather data.

Ms. Mauter continued to review the 2020 marketing plan and highlighted strategy changes for 2020 that included more relationship-building opportunities, better internal communications, localizing media and marketing, changing earned media, social media re-focus and adding "pop-up" and special pricing promotions. She also said with 2020 being a presidential election year and the advertising market would be crowded with a lot of political spots.

Commissioner Williams said he liked the idea of localized emails for events.

Commissioner McCarthy asked if staff planned to continue services with Truscott Rossman. Director McMillan said staff would continue to use Truscott Rossman on an as needed basis.

Commissioner McCarthy said he recently read an article in the Detroit Free Press that said seniors had to buy permits in person. He asked if that issue could be fixed when the new POS system was in place and asked when the POS system would be in place. Ms. McMillan said the POS system (RecTrac) would be in place before the start of the summer season and once it is in place, seniors would have to buy a senior permit in person the first time and then would be able to renew online after that.

Commissioner Quadrozzi asked how staff determined the number of cars to achieve as a goal for 2020. Ms. Mauter said the staff used the same benchmark data used for 2019 from the Detroit Riverfront Conversancy in terms of their 1 percent attendance at events, which translated to 30,000 roughly vehicles for the Metroparks.

Commissioner Quadrozzi said that a 30 percent increase for attendance at interpretive services programs seemed high and asked how that goal was determined. Ms. Mauter said she worked with Jennifer Jaworski, chief of interpretive services, on determining the goal and that 30 percent goal was for regular program series that bring in repeat visitors.

Commissioner Parker said the increases set for interpretive centers seemed low, as did the overall goals. He also said didn't see any goals for targeting urban areas and asked why. Ms. Mauter said goals for urban areas were included in the strategic section of the plan.

Commissioner Parker said he would like to see targeted goals for urban areas.

Ms. McMillan said staff does reach out to local churches in the Southern District where the business has dropped off over the years. She said a way staff can measure how impactful local campaigns are by looking at the zip code scanning data from year-to-year to see where there was a market increase. The new POS system will also help staff determine the areas patrons are and are not coming from.

Commissioner Marans suggested adding footnotes to next year's plan on how marketing staff determined the goals and what departments were involved. He also said he sees the election year as an advantage and asked staff if they have reached out to candidates to handout Metroparks literature when campaigning. Ms. Mauter said staff would look into having candidates' handout literature.

Commissioner Parker voted no.

Motion carried.

7. Reports

A. Administrative Department

3. Approval – Purchasing Policy

Motion by Commissioner McCarthy, support from Commissioner Rea that the Board of Commissioners approved the Purchasing Policy as recommended by Director Amy McMillan and staff.

<u>Discussion</u>: Director McMillan said she did not receive any comments from the Board regarding the purchasing policy. She said the proposed policy would be the foundation for purchasing going forward and that several items were added to the policy as a result of discussions held with board members over the course of the last year (professional services and tie bid language).

Ms. McMillan said language for local vendor preference is the only place in the policy that addresses local preference. Staff reviewed several other organization's policies that address local preference and have not found one that fits the Metroparks yet. She said there were also questions as to what "local" means to the Metroparks — bids from all five counties and which vendor is most local or does local mean the person or business. Ms. McMillan said staff hasn't received a consensus on language for diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) regarding women and minority-owned businesses and was not added to the proposed policy. However, staff could bring an amended purchasing policy to the Board at a later time with language for both local preference and DEI.

Commissioner Heise said the proposed policy is better than the current one and can always be amended once the board see how it works.

Commissioner Rea said he was impressed with the language and guidelines.

Commissioner Parker said he was disappointed that language for local advantage was not included as he has been talking about it for a long time. He said he understands that staff hasn't developed the correct language, but you can't change something that isn't included.

Commissioner Marans asked if it was a working document. Ms. McMillan said yes, and that staff could come back to the Board with more examples for local preference language.

Commissioner Williams said he agrees with Commissioner Parker; however, he would vote in favor of the policy.

Commissioner Parker made a motion to have an amendment in 90 days for language on a local advantage program.

No support.

Commissioner Parker voted no.

Motion carried.

7. Reports

4. Approval – Metroparks Branded TV/video Commercials Production, Winter Season Motion by Commissioner Quadrozzi, support from Commissioner Williams that the Board of Commissioners approve the Metroparks TV production estimate from Factory Detroit, Inc., in the amount not to exceed \$75,000 to include video shoot, post production and contingency as recommended by Chief of Marketing and Communications Danielle Mauter and staff.

<u>Discussion</u>: Ms. Mauter said Factory Detroit would shoot video, weather permitting, as they did for the summer and fall.

<u>Discussion:</u> Chief of Planning and Development Nina Kelly acknowledged staff that worked on the amended plan.

Motion carried unanimously.

2. Report – 2020 Recreation Programming Work Plan

Motion by Commissioner McCarthy, support from Commissioner Heise that the Board of Commissioners receive and file the report on the 2020 Recreation Programming Work Plan as recommended by Chief of Planning and Development Nina Kelly and staff.

<u>Discussion:</u> Ms. Kelly introduced Janet Van De Winkle, grant writer and recreation programs coordinator, who presented the recreation programming work plan.

Ms. Van De Winkle reviewed the implementation plan and goals that included continuing and developing partnerships, grow the value of the annual permit, increase revenue streams from programming and adding a signature event in each district. She highlighted the signature events planned for Hudson Mills, Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair Metroparks. Ms. Van De Winkle said MOUs with partner organizations and sponsorship packages would be completed by the end of January.

Commissioner Heise asked if staff had specific businesses identified to work with on the signature events. Ms. Van De Winkle staff has several businesses in mind but would like recommendations from board members as well.

Ms. Van De Winkle reviewed recreation programming that included swim lessons at Lake St. Clair, movies in the park, the Great American Campout in June, a kid's concert series, the Detroit Institute of Arts Inside/Out program, field trips with the Detroit Public School Community District and a marina harvest festival at Lake St. Clair.

Public Input

Public Input Summary

Over the duration of the Recreation Programming Plan planning process, the Metroparks Planning and Development Department ensured a variety of opportunities for public input and feedback. The process could be followed at meetings and input on questionnaires, comment cards, and online comments based on the draft plan posted on the Huron-Clinton Metroparks Planning Department Website and hard copies made available at each Metropark and Community Centers:

Overview of Input Opportunities

Public Survey Movie Nights (August 10, 17, 24) – located at the Willow, Kensington and Stony Creek. Stakeholders and members of the public had the opportunity to provide input on programming and activities in the parks. The public from all areas strongly preferred Hiking/Running/Walking (ie. Walking Groups, Marathons) and Special Events (ie. Fireworks, Movies in the Park, Summer Concert Series) as their favorite types of programming within the Metroparks.

Public Input Surveys – online surveys were developed to gather information to consider opportunities to grow and improve recreation programming. The surveys were made available for the duration of the planning process. The public could find the surveys on links located on hard copy flyers, social media blasts, metroparks website, as well as hard copy questionnaires made available by community partners (libraries, local government offices, and community recreational resource partners).

Huron Clinton Metroparks Planning Department Website – the public could email comments on the Amended Community Recreation Plan Draft for a two week period. https://www.metroparks.com/about-us/planning-department/.

The website also posted information on the public hearing on the proposed amendments to the Community Recreation Plan held on Thursday, January 9, 2020. The public hearing was held prior to the scheduled Board of Commissioners meeting at the Huron-Clinton Metroparks Administrative Office, 13000 High Ridge Drive, Brighton, Michigan 48114.

Public Review of Draft Amendment Community Recreation Plan- A press release of the electronic version linked to the website along with hard copies of the Draft Amendment Community Recreation Plan were made available for public review at each of the thirteen metroparks and in local community centers located in each of the three Metropark districts.

Public Survey Movie Nights (August 10, 17, 24)

A strong majority of respondents from public participation opportunities listed movies at the park as a top choice for programs they were most interested in attending. Similarly, other top choices from this audience were Music in the park and Kid friendly events and activities. Fireworks was a top choice overall mainly due to its popularity among respondents from the Southern and Eastern Districts. Swimming was not a top choice for respondents overall but was in the top 3 selections for respondents from both the Eastern and Southern Districts as well. In the Western District only, Nature hikes and walks made the top 3 programs.

- 77 total people took the survey at the movie nights in the parks.
- Overall, the top responses to the open-ended question "What types of programs or events are you most interested in attending?" were:
 - o Movies at the Park, Movie Night, Kids Movies (22)
 - o Fireworks (15)
 - Music in the Park, Concerts, Band, Mexican Music (12)
- 27 people who live in Western District Zip codes took the survey, their top responses were:
 - o Movies at the Park, Movie Night, Kids Movies (7)
 - Nature Hikes, Nature Walks, See Woods (6)
 - o Music in the Park, Concerts, Band, Mexican Music (5)
 - Kid Friendly, Kids Activities, Kid Sports, Kid Events, Kids Night (5)
- 19 people who live in Southern District Zip codes took the survey, their top responses were:
 - o Fireworks (7)
 - Movies at the Park, Movie Night, Kids Movies (6)
 - Swimming (3)
 - Kid Friendly, Kids Activities, Kid Sports, Kid Events, Kids Night (3)
- 17 People who live in Eastern District Zip codes took the survey, their top responses were:
 - o Fireworks (5)
 - Movies at the Park, Movie Night, Kids Movies (3)
- 14 people who live in other areas took the survey, their top responses were:
 - Movies at the Park, Movie Night, Kids Movies (6)
 - Music, Concerts, Band, Mexican Music (5)
 - o Swimming (3)

Recreation Programming Plan Public Input Survey (Questionnaire)

An online survey was developed to gather information to consider opportunities to grow and improve recreation programming. The survey was made available for 7 weeks during the planning process online as well as hard copies available at park offices for distribution.

A total of 2,876 respondents participated in the online survey. The public from all areas strongly preferred Hiking/Running/Walking (ie. Walking Groups, Marathons) and Special Events (ie. Fireworks, Movies in the Park, Summer Concert Series) as their favorite types of programming within the Metroparks.

Dear Ms. Kelly:

Thank you for your response to my question regarding the construction project at the Stony Creek Metropark Boat Launch. I hope in the future that construction failures of that nature are: 1. Not repeated and 2. Fully disclosed to the public as our tax dollars are underwriting these projects. After enduring all the inconvenience and mess of that construction project, a notice should have been posted at the site stating specifically why the project was scrapped.

The comments below pertain only to Stony Creek Metropark as that is the park we visit most often.

- 1. There are too many lawn mowers that seem to run constantly. They create noise pollution as well as air pollution. The grass just does not need to be cut that short and that often. The mowers also leave gravel in the bike trails that is not cleaned up afterwards creating a hazard for people riding in the bike lane. Over the years, we've noticed an increase in the use of weed killers especially right by Stony Creek Lake. There are no good reasons to use any type of pesticide in a public park.
- 2. So much of the park is now under some sort of "construction". Few areas in the park are natural. Not all areas need to be manicured. We understand the need to eradicate the non-native invasive species but many areas that used to be covered with wildflowers and butterflies, no longer exist. There is also a favorite spot where a natural bog has been for years that is now disappearing. I believe it's from all the dredging and mowing nearby. You no longer hear frogs or see the turtles that have lived in this wet land for as long as I can remember. This was also a favorite spot for indigo buntings.
- 3. Park funds should be used to maintain native habitats and native species. Less construction of giant slides (what an eye sore), restaurants, etc. and more planting of native trees and flowers.
- 4. Enforcement of the 10 mph speed limit on the trail is a tall order but there should be an effort made to have some sort of monitoring system to keep rouge bike riders in check who create a dangerous situation to walkers.
- 5. The shooting range located just outside the Stony Creek Nature Center is scary at best. Nothing like having a relaxing walk amongst the gunfire. There should be a long term goal to purchase that property and extend the park.

Overall, the Metroparks are a unique and wonderful experience. We are fortunate in Michigan for the foresight earlier planners had in creating this park system for all to enjoy. Thank you for the opportunity to air our opinions and concerns.

Recreation Programming Plan Forms

Fees and charges policy and schedules (5.1.1)

The Huron-Clinton Metroparks require vehicle passes for vehicular entry at each Metropark. Rates for annual and daily vehicle passes, boat passes, and combo passes are set by the Metroparks Board of Commissioners. Annual passes are valid from the time of purchase through December 31st of that year, and all passes allow access to all 13 Metroparks. There are discounts for seniors age 62+ and Disabled Veterans have free park entry with a state-issued Disabled Veteran license plate. Entry for pedestrians, inline skaters, and bicyclists is free of charge.

There are numerous free activities at each Metropark and there are activities, rentals, and interpretive programs available for a fee. Fees sorted by activity are on the Metroparks website at https://www.metroparks.com/activities/ where users can find pricing and reservation information at the Metropark of their choice. Alternatively, users can find which park they are planning to visit and click on the activity they are planning to do to see fees.

The Metroparks has Revenue Policies which are part of the Financial Policies and are approved by the Board of Commissioners. The Revenue Policies are as follows:

The Metroparks will strive to develop and maintain a diversified and reliable revenue stream to avoid becoming overly dependent on any single type of revenue. Efforts will be directed to optimize existing revenue sources while periodically reviewing potential new revenue sources.

Budgeted revenues will be estimated conservatively based on historical trends and other trends specific to a provided activity. The Metroparks will avoid using temporary/one-time revenues to fund ongoing expenditures.

The Metroparks will impose user fees whenever appropriate. User fees will be based on a survey of comparable fees charged by other public agencies and private enterprise and on market conditions. All Metropark fees and charges will be reviewed and approved by the Board of Commissioners on an annual basis.

Participant and Spectator Code of Conduct

The Huron-Clinton Metroparks are home to many sporting facilities in our 13 Metroparks across Macomb, Oakland, Livingston, Washtenaw, and Wayne Counties. The Metroparks maintain these facilities but do not run or manage any sporting leagues. Therefore, the following code of conduct shall be followed by all users of sporting facilities in addition to their league's code of conduct.

Participants are expected to:

- 1. Take direction from their coach, officials, and other league staff.
- 2. Act respectfully towards others before, during, and after practices or games.
- 3. Follow all Huron-Clinton Metroparks Rules and Regulations in addition to their team's or league's rules.
- 4. Notify Metroparks Police or 911 in case of emergency.

Spectators, including parents, are expected to:

- 1. Be a role model for their child and other players by demonstrating positive support for everyone.
- 2. Support the decisions of the coach, officials, and other league staff.
- 3. Act respectfully towards others before, during, and after practices or games.
- 4. Notify Metroparks Police or 911 in case of emergency.

Infractions of the Code of Conduct may include, but are not limited to the following:

- Unsportsmanlike conduct
- Offensive or negative language
- Disrespectful behavior
- Fighting or deliberate roughness
- Repeated delay of game or practice
- Damage to Metroparks property

Penalties for infractions are as follows:

If Metroparks Police respond to a situation, warnings, tickets, and/or arrests will be made as necessary. No refunds will be given to players, spectators, or parents ejected due to poor behavior.
