Pre-visit activities are provided to prepare your students for the information we will cover.

- Dramatic play of baby bird growing up
- Discuss butterfly life cycle
- Dramatic play of caterpillar to butterfly

- Discuss mammal life cycle
- Opossum game
- Bring around opossum fur and skull
- Guessing game song
